Data was collected through focus group discussions with practicing social workers in Kisii County who were purposively selected . The finding of this study indicate that Social workers play a crucial role in preventing obstetric fistula in Kisii County. They provide essential support and services to women at risk of or experiencing obstetric fistula, by offering counseling and emotional support, they address fears and misconceptions, encouraging women to seek timely and skilled care. They also serve as a link in the healthcare system, facilitating referrals to appropriate healthcare providers and rehabilitation services. Social workers advocate for women's rights and work towards improving access to quality healthcare services. The study recommends increased investment in maternal healthcare services and increased training and support for social workers to effectively prevent obstetric fistula in Kisii County.
