## Effects of Covid-19 pandemic on Religious Activities and Faith of Worshippers in Kenya; A Study of Narok Town, Kenya

## Abstract

The novel covid-19 pandemic led to changes in lifestyles and other social activities in religious gatherings. In Kenya, the government restricted attendance of worship places in 2020 to help curb the spread of covid-19. This study sought to determine the impact restriction on the members' faith and activities towards their religions. A descriptive surv carried out in Narok town, as a representative of other parts of the country. Questionna interview guides, as well as observations, were used for data collection. The study found of the majority of the members still had a strong faith in their religious activities such as readi books and following weekly sermons on media. However, there was a significant difference is religious activities carried out by worshippers before and after the pandemic. Radio and tel were the most exploited media for transmitting weekly sermons. A good proportion respondents were afraid that continuous absenteeism from worship places would significant their faith.
